# Community Conversations by Zoom - with Minister Williams

## **Opportunities we heard:**

- → The sector wants to be engaged and involved in developing solutions – and has ideas for recovery
- → Government investment needs to be in social infrastructure as well as physical infrastructure
- → Simplify funding environment, → application processes and processing speeds
- → This is a chance to be bold; we don't want to go back to the way things were
- → Support innovation and impact
- → New business models, such as social enterprises, are required by community organisations
- → New ways of partnering and two-way conversations with government
- → We are collaborating differently with Iwi and Hāpu, we need to continue this
- → It would be great to lock in some of the environmental gains that we're experiencing
- → Can we roll up opportunities for collaboration and impact?
- → Generosity seems to be increasing – how can we channel that? Foundations
  – already have business/ corporate links and can help to link others

- → Growing capacity and leadership in the sector – bringing in young leaders
- → There is an opportunity to bring into effect the Living Standards Framework set by Treasury
- Encourage collaboration by creating hubs for NGOs and funders where they share back end services – could be part funded by govt and part by funders?
- → Listen to the voice of communities and respond to their needs (not necessarily the same as organisations' needs)
- Work in partnership with other government agencies, councils, other funders - it can't all come from Crown
- Incentivise private donations
- → Find new ways to demonstrate the value of volunteers and to reduce barriers to volunteering
- → Use technology more to bring people together
- → Shift government language to focus on social and community well-being, not just economic recovery


## The needs we are hearing:

	There is duplication and not enough of an outcome focus
