Hi Jamie,

Thanks for getting a response to me yesterday. I have a couple of questions for a follow-up story I'm writing today.

- GWRC chair Daran Ponter says the council needs approval from HNZ within the next month to avoid the trial project being delayed. Is HNZ aware of this, and does it plan to approve the designs within the next month?

Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga is aware of the critical timing of the project. We previously gave our support in principal and this was, today, followed up with formal approval in writing. As required in the heritage covenants protecting this Category 1 historic place, Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga provided the owner (KiwiRail) "written consent for the trial validator system," noting that "Heritage New Zealand supports the works."

Discussions led by Metlink that including Heritage New Zealand, Greater Wellington Regional Council, Wellington City Council, and an independent heritage consultant, are still in progress to help make the validator programme the best it can be. Heritage New Zealand is pleased to be included in them and will continue to offer advice through this cooperative forum.

- Political commentator Neale Jones says debate over the colour of the Snapper validators is a waste of time, and HNZ seems to be "standing up for old buildings rather than the city having a future" at every turn. He was referring here to HNZ's lobbying to protect pre-1930s homes as part of the Wellington City Council's spatial plan? Can I please have a response to these statements?

We respectfully disagree with your presentation of Mr Jones's assessment of our roles and responsibilities as set out in the Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga Act 2014 and about the value of heritage and its conservation to all New Zealanders. As the lead national historic heritage agency, the mission of Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga is to identify, protect, and promote heritage – that's our job. Heritage provides a tangible record of the nation's past while also looking forward to our shared future. The conservation of heritage will provide for a dynamic and richer life experience for all New Zealanders and the communities they live in.

Our varied roles with regard to heritage extend to planning advice on such topics as spatial planning. The dichotomy set up between "standing up for old buildings" versus "the city having a future" is a false one – both can happily coexist and provide for interesting and liveable communities as happens in cities throughout the world. Good urban design takes into account a city's unique assets—heritage included—while also permitting and guiding change over time. People who are interested in looking at this complex issue further can view our submission, and many others, on the draft spatial plan for Wellington, which are public documents and available online.

- Lastly, what is HNZ's preferred design for the Snapper validators?
Heritage New Zealand agrees with the KiwiRail conservation architect and the urban designer's advice of Wellington City Council that the preferred design should be as neat and tidy as possible to avoid clutter while still providing for efficient use. We are confident this can be achieved.

I would greatly appreciate this email being forwarded to the right area/person/people in the respective organizations. Cheers.

I am deeply disappointed by the most recent Stuff article (<u>Article Here</u>) detailing the troubled Snapper on trains process, and quite frankly bicker between your two Govt organisations.

Unfortunately, the Ministry for Culture and Heritage (MCH) has used the excuse that the train station is a category 1 heritage site. While this is true, so is Britomart Station in Auckland. However, they seem to be doing fine with their terminals and recent construction to do with CityRailLink.

I don't understand why the card validators need to be Metlink/GWRC coloured as they could be neutral (black), and that would look subtle and appealing. But I also cannot sit quietly while MCH recommends that they be coloured dark brown as that is totally disgusting. In my opinion, the train station needs a new lick of paint and a bit of a repair (look up to see how many top floor windows are broken - it's not exactly the sort of building I'd be defending in its state, right now).

Furthermore, with the recent additions of the jumbotron screen and the Metlink information centre, the station is already co-existing with newer architectural styles, making MCH's point obsolete anyway.

This disagreement should not be the reason for delays to this system which is well overdue in the capital. I hope to have triggered some more thought and ensure that you understand the public view on this, that as a commuter, I don't have a problem with the old and new sharing Wellington Station, just as it will need to if we are going to continue to grow as a country.

- The planned installation of Snapper validators has been a collaborative approach. The Snapper validators are a trial of systems and equipment. The trial installation will help plan the permanent system, looking for the successes and difficulties of a new method of ticketing.
- The aim is to iron out all the problems for the long term solution. The process is being lead by the Greater Wellington Regional Council. There will be ongoing conversations for consenting and the trial of the new equipment.
- The Snapper validator trial is at pre-consent stage where Heritage New Zealand has been asked for advice as part of consultation. Heritage New Zealand has already discussed the trial over a period of time, and provided a written advice letter.
