Dear Chief Commissioner

I acknowledge your letters dated 21 February and 16 February inviting Government representatives to a meeting for the purposes of allowing those currently illegally occupying the grounds of Parliament and surrounding areas to outline their human rights concerns.

The government continues to decline the request which has been made directly by protesters for several reasons.

As you will be aware, the Speaker in his role as Chair of the Parliamentary Services Commission issued a statement on behalf of all parties stating "there will be no dialogue with protestors currently occupying the Parliamentary Precinct and surrounding areas until the protest returns to one within the law, including the clearing of all illegally parked vehicles that are blocking streets, the removal of unauthorised structures, and the cessation of the intimidation of Wellingtonians". Further, the statement noted the "history of Parliamentarians attending peaceful protests or hearing from the leaders of groups who are at Parliament peacefully". We continue to support this position.

To that end, I note the Police continue to engage with the protest leaders to secure an outcome that sees the protest move to a legal position. We want to support the Police in their operations. If you have not already, I would encourage you to seek a briefing from the Police on their operation and approach.

In addition, the abuse and intimidation which is an unfortunate and persistent feature of this protest is having a disproportionate effect on Wellingtonians. You will be well aware of the daily threats Wellingtonians have had to endure these past few weeks and I trust you have heard their views. The scenes of protesters throwing human waste at Police yesterday and similar scenes this morning are the latest examples of the unacceptable behaviour perpetuated by the protest.

Setting aside the immediate request to meet protestors, I do want to speak to their stated demands. The Government's position must consider the rights of all New Zealanders. With the Omicron outbreak growing, the immediate removal of public health measures, as they have proposed, would have a disproportionate effect on our most vulnerable populations, such as immune compromised, at risk communities with significant comorbidities and older New Zealanders. To that end, the Government is particularly concerned about the equity effects of the outbreak. The Government has been working closely with Maori and Pacific community providers to increase vaccination, grow booster rates and rollout the paediatric doses. These measures have always been supplemented by public health measures to provide the best protection, while also allowing as much normality of life as possible.



I believe this demonstrates our ongoing work to ensure a safe easing of restrictions. I trust you will understand the position.



The meeting held this afternoon included representatives from Voices for Freedom and the Human Rights Commission. Others represented included the Police, Freedom and Rights Coalition and independents.

"The job given to the Human Rights Commission, Te Kāhui Tika Tangata, by Parliament is to listen, conciliate, educate and advance human rights and responsibilities for all" says Hunt.

"It's clear that the protesters who I have met with have very real stories of loss and suffering. They feel broken and discarded due to the impact of Covid-19 health measures on their lives.

"These are people who have lost loved ones, who have suffered severe side-effects of vaccination, and lost jobs.

"I have a duty to listen to their concerns to understand how their human rights have been impacted" says Hunt.

"In my discussions, I make it clear that I am not affirming their views and I condemn the outrageous conduct of some protesters. I also acknowledge the harmful impact the protest has had on many in our community."

Chief Commissioner Hunt says that listening to the claims of the protesters is an important contribution to help prevent the protests from dragging across months or turning into further violence, as other Covid-related protests overseas have.

"In such a heated, fraught moment, we have to move from fear, to hope, and that cannot be done without listening and talking."


The conciliation being led by Chief Commissioner Hunt will continue as a multistage process, and involve a range of stakeholders, including mana whenua, the Police, the Commission's chief mediator and the Mayor of Wellington. Hunt has asked the Prime Minister to ensure her government engages in this constructive process.


