Following the tragic fire at Loafers Lodge, our organisational priority is to assist Police in their operations and enquiries and ensure we are focussed on and supporting the wellbeing of our people.

At the request of our National Commander, we will conduct an Operational Review into the Loafers Lodge fire. This review will follow the investigation into the cause and origin of the fire which forms part of the Police investigation. The

terms of reference for this Review are yet to be finalised. In the meantime, Operational Assurance will facilitate our command debriefs and our After Actions Reviews with those commanders, officers, ComCen personnel and firefighters who played key roles during the initial firefighting and rescues.

- Removal of partition walls to assist police with evidence dump

- Construction of 4th floor window infills to assist with asbestos mitigation

Good evening Team

As of yesterday, at the request of the then lead Specialist Fire Investigator, supported by both the District and Regional Manager, the lead for this investigation has transferred to myself.

I can now advise that as of this afternoon, sadly, the total number of confirmed fatalities for the Loafers Lodge incident is now 5 building occupants.

As of this afternoon the 'mezzanine' floor has not been able to be comprehensively searched by USAR, Specialist Fire Investigators or the various divisions of the Police. Without speculating, the 'mezzanine' floor is an area of concern as about 50% of the floor has collapsed and the remainder has areas that are considered as unsafe to enter at present. These areas will need to be shored and propped before we are able to enter them. Prior to that debris on Level 3, the floor immediately below, will need to be assessed for its relevance to the fires origin and cause as part of the fire investigation.

As you will have heard through the news media, Police have arrested a person who has been charged with two counts of Arson and further, more serious charges have been suggested as pending. Therefore, these deaths will not be counted as avoidable residential fire fatalities.

This incident now brings the total number of fire deaths for the 2022 – 2023 year to 28. The number of avoidable residential fire fatalities remains at 10.

At the same time last year, the total number of fire deaths was 19, whilst the number of avoidable residential fire fatalities was 12.

As previously mentioned, as the Police are the Lead Agency requests for information should be

referred to them.

As you will already be aware, at 00:25 this morning Fire and Emergency received a call to Loafers Lodge, 160 Adelaide Road, Mount Cook, Wellington.

On arrival, 2 minutes and 19 seconds after receipt of the call, firefighters found the building to be on fire with a rapidly escalating and serious incident which reached a '5th Alarm'.

The building has been described as transient accommodation and housed a broad spectrum of people over its history.

The building has been well known to firefighters and has been the scene of many fire calls over the years.

As a result of this incident there have been an unconfirmed number of fatalities, currently in the single digits and several people transported to hospital with statuses of moderate to serious.

The investigation by Wellington Specialist Fire Investigators is in its early stages and being assisted by a Senior Specialist Fire Investigator from the Fire Research and Investigation Unit from National Headquarters.

The investigation is in its early stages and is expected to take some days and involve various sectors of Police, USAR and other agencies.

I am unable to provide information as to whether this is an avoidable residential fire fatality or what impact this will have on the total number of fire fatalities at this time.



Introduction

The tragic fire at Loafers Lodge on Adelaide Road, Newtown has taken lives, destroyed homes and has had major impact on our organisation and community. Our organisational priorities are to assist Police in their operations and ensure we keep a focus the wellbeing of our People. To ensure Fire and Emergency have a coordinated approach to assisting other agencies, completing our own investigations and appropriate learnings, the DCE Service Delivery Design (SDD), on behalf of the National Commander, is setting up a team to manage this.

Review Coordination Team

Information to Date

1. Our fire investigators are presently conducting standard origin and cause fire investigation alongside NZ Police who are conducting their investigation. This investigation process could be protracted. The investigation is being led by Senior Specialist Fire Investigator and supported by the Wellington District fire investigation team. will coordinate this aspect of the plan and provide whatever resource is requested to support the origin and cause investigation.





- 2. In liaison with and at the request of the Wellington DM Operational Assurance will facilitate the formal debrief(s) they may need to be held in several locations around Wellington due to the number of crews who attended the fire from around the District. This will commence when the DM decides, which will likely be once psychological debriefing has occurred and welfare arrangements are in place. Piki Thomas will be observer as our welfare lead.
- 3. Operational Assurance will also facilitate a command debrief with all commanders and officers who played key roles during the initial fire fighting and rescues; This will likely compose the first arriving SSO and SO, initial AC's who attended, incident safety officer, and the initial DM and subsequent handover the Wellington District Manager.
- 4. Following the initial fire investigation the focus will be on the building Fire Safety compliance? this will involve an in depth look at our history with the building both from Newtown crews and the risk reduction and community readiness teams, a PIA(post incident analysis) conducted by Fire Engineers to understand how the building behaved in the fire, how fire safety systems worked or not, what was our relationship and interaction with the WCC Building Inspectorate etc. This team will also have representation from our legal advisors and be led by
- 5. We will conduct the formal operational review. This will follow the usual format focussed on the lessons learnt approach what worked well, what didn't work well, what could we do to improve for any future incidents? The review will be led by an independent (TBC) will consider command and control, as well as performance of PPE, appliances and equipment, welfare support during and after the fire, and safety, health, and wellbeing. The terms of reference will be developed by the National Commander, DCE SDD, RM, and DM. The review will follow a similar process to the Operational Review into Severe Weather Events i.e. using Operational Assurance debriefs etc to finalise TOR.
- 6. Regulatory Compliance Review TBC
- 7. We will undertake a 'Regulations Review which will be a broad and significant piece of work across the evacuation scheme and building fire safety space that will require its own scoping and programme of work. It will potentially involve organisational strategy, review of operating model, policies & procedures, training, and implementation etc.



Subject: Loafers Lodge - Update

Kia ora everyone,

An update on the Loafers Lodge incident, as well as the attached Internal Recovery Plan V1. The intent of this plan is to give you an overview of what will be occurring over the next weeks and months in relation to the Loafers Lodge fire. This plan will be updated with further details as they come to hand.

Scene Update – Our Specialist Fire Investigators (SFI's) and USAR are still actively working on site, supporting the Police operation. We are also having a Command Unit of site, while operations are in progress, along with a pumping appliance at all times. The requirement for having a pump of site will end, once the last of the victims has been removed. Our SFI's are carrying out the painstaking task of working through the site to accurately determine the cause of the fire and location of origin. They are also supporting the Police in with victim locating. They will potentially continue with their onsite investigation well after Police operations have ceased. Please also be aware that if you are carrying out a standby on site, you will need to follow the onsite asbestos management plan.

Incident Note Taking

Many staff who attended the Loafers Lodge fire will be asked to recall events some time into the future. After a period of time memories can fade and details can be blurred. Therefore, if you were involved in this incident it is important to make personal notes and to record the event from your perspective. All firefighters and officers who were involved in:

- Firefighting in or near the building
- Search and rescue operations
- Command and control
- Any task inside the building
- Any interactions with the occupants

If this applies to you, please take the time in the next day or so to note down there observations.

Look to note the answers to the following questions:

- What information did you have enroute?
- ₩hat did you observe on arrival?
- What were you tasked to do and by whom?
- What actions did you take and what did you observe while taking them?
- Who were you with while carrying out your tasks?
- Did you interact with any building occupants, and if so, what were the details of those interactions?

This is a lot of information, but it is important that you note these observations and experiences as soon as possible to assist your recollection for potential future reference at reviews, enquiries or audits.

Just to be clear, the notes you take are a personal record to aid your recollection of events and are to be held by you until required to inform a review, enquiry or audit. They do not need to be shared with anybody. Although, if you have information that will assist the Police in any criminal investigation, then you should provide that as soon as possible. However, if Police request to speak with you as part of their investigation, it is recommended that you refer them to your Group Manager, CRM or Comcen Manager to arrange and approve any such meeting and follow NZPFU advice in relation to having someone present.

If you are required to be interviewed or take part in external reviews, you will be fully supported by Fire and Emergency NZ.

Lastly, thank you again for all your efforts over what has been an incredibly trying week.

This event impacted across the Wellington District and Central Communication Centre.

Primary impact was Communications Centre Staff, career (including USAR) and volunteer personnel who attended the incident, Specialist Fire Investigators and Executive Officers.

Secondary impact is across the Fire and Emergency nationally. This plan focusses on the recovery requirements of the Wellington District and Central Communications Centre.

SITUATION

This is a significant incident that has drawn national and international attention. There will be a number of enquiries and investigations associated with this incident, as well as a prolonged high level of media interest.

The purpose of this plan is to provide an overview of the Wellington Districts internal recovery programme over the coming weeks and months.

Welfare Support

The Wellington District will ensure that all of our people have the opportunity to receive the welfare support that they require to recover effectively from this incident.

Operational Reviewing

The Wellington District will ensure that the recommendations from the operational reviews and debriefs that occur as a result of this incident, will result in operational changes that have a positive impact on our future service delivery.

Cause Determination and Site Management

The Wellington District will ensure that the Fire Investigation Report is completed in a robust, peer reviewed and timely fashion, that meets the requirements of a criminal court process, should that be required.

The Wellington District will also ensure that Specialist Fire Investigators are available to assist the NZ Police as long as that assistance is required on site.

ADMIN & LOGISTICS

This plan is broken down into three sections with a District Leadership Team (DLT) member responsible for each section.

Each DLT member will manage their administration and logistic support requirements, using BAU support, to deliver their sections objectives.

The Wellington District will be support by National teams, through a governance structure.





Good evening everyone,

You will all be well aware of the significant fatal fire which occurred at Loafers Lodge in Adelaide Rd, early yesterday morning.

Many of you attended, and while this was an immensely tragic incident, because of your direct actions more than 50 people escaped or were rescued. You did an incredible job under the most trying and challenging circumstances any Firefighter or Comcen operator would face. The Prime Minister and Minister of Internal Affairs visited the incident ground later yesterday morning and on your behalf I accepted their sincere gratitude and appreciation for your commitment and the significant work you undertook. This was a deeply sad day, but please remember those who are here today, because of your actions.

I want to also give you an update on the current situation and what the next steps will be.

Today the incident was formally handed over to the New Zealand Police, who have indicated that they are treating this as a potential crime scene. For us, this means that we are now supporting the Police and will continue to assist, as tasked. In terms of media requests, this means that no one, myself included are to make comment to the media. All media enquiries are to be directed to media@fireandemergency.nz, who will liaise with the Police communications team. In terms of a

presence at the incident group, until further notice we will continue to have an appliance and crew in attendance. Other resources will be requested as required. We currently have members of the Central USAR team in attendance. Their taskings have been initially to carry out an assessment of the structure integrity of the building (with our USAR engineer) and shore up areas, where this has been compromised. They have also assisted by erecting privacy partitions to the building entranceway.

Over the next two days, we will release our Recovery Plan for this incident. This will outline our Released under the Official Information Act priorities and a workplan for how these will be achieved. This plan will focus on three key priorities:

Hi Nick

Here's a draft as discussed, free for you to alter as you see fit. insisted that the note re the holding of the notes by individuals was included, so we don't use the info to take any sort of disciplinary action.

Incident Notes

Many staff who attended the Loafers Lodge fire will be asked to recall events some time into the future. After a period of time memories can fade and details can be blurred. Therefore, if you were involved in this incident it is important to make personal notes and to record the event from your perspective. All firefighters and officers who were involved in:

- · Firefighting in or near the building
- Search and rescue operations
- Command and control
- · Any task inside the building
- Any interactions with the occupants

Must take the time in the next day or so to note down there observations.

Look to note the answers to the following questions:

- What information did you have enroute?
- What did you observe on arrival?
- What were you tasked to do and by whom?
- What actions did you take and what did you observe while taking them?
- Who were you with while carrying out your tasks?
- Did you interact with any building occupants, and if so, what were the details of those interactions?

This is a lot of information, but it is important that you note these observations and experiences as soon as possible to assist your recollection for potential future reference at reviews, enquiries or audits.

Just to be clear, the notes you take are a personal record to aid your recollection of events and are to be held by you until required to inform a review, enquiry or audit. They do not need to be shared with anybody. If you have information that will assist the Police in any criminal investigation, then you should provide that as soon as possible.



FENZ Loafers Lodge Fire Plan

Introduction

The tragic fire at Loafers Lodge on Adelaide Road, Newtown is quite naturally getting a lot of external and internal attention, as well as a lot of political interest. To ensure Fire and Emergency NZ have a coordinated approach to completing all their responsibilities the DCE, Service Delivery Design (SDD), on behalf of the National Commander, is setting up a team from with the SDD to manage this.

The team will be coordinated by Trevor Brown and will have the following main elements:

- 1. Our fire investigators will conduct the standard origin and cause fire investigation once NZ Police have completed their investigation and handed the building over to FENZ. This could be some days yet. The investigation is being led by the Wellington District fire investigation team but with direct support from our NHQ investigation team.

 will coordinate this aspect of the plan and provide whatever resource is requested to support the Wellington District team.
- 2. In liaison with and at the request of the Wellington DM Operational Assurance will facilitate the formal debrief(s) they may need to be held in several locations around Wellington due to the number of crews who attended the fire from around the District. This will commence when the DM decides and once Fenz have handed the building back to the owner.
- 3. Operational Assurance will also facilitate a command debrief with all officers who played key roles during the initial fire fighting and rescues; This will likely compose the first arriving SSO and SO, initial GM's who attended, incident safety officer, and the initial DM and subsequent handover the Wellington District Manager.
- 4. Following the initial fire investigation the focus will be on the Fire Safety component this will involve an in depth look at our history with the building both from Newtown crews and the risk reduction and community readiness teams, a PIA(post incident analysis) conducted by Fire Engineers to understand how the building behaved in the fire, how fire safety systems worked or not, what was our relationship and interaction with the WCC Building Inspectorate etc. This team will also have representation from our legal advisors.
- 5. Once the debriefs have been completed the Operational Assurance team will conduct the formal operational review. This will follow the usual format focussed on the lessons learnt approach what worked well, what didn't work well, what could we do to improve for any future incidents? The review will consider command and control, as well as performance of PPE, appliances and equipment, welfare support during and after the fire, and safety, health, and wellbeing. The terms of reference will be developed by the National Commander, DCE SDD, RM, and DM.

Other than the mezzanine and roof all issues with structural stability in relation to this incident are now in the hands of Wellington City Council.

A meeting between Council Police and USAR this morning confirming this handover occurred 0930 hrs this morning.

USAR Engineers stability report email has been sent to WCC and Police.

NZ USAR still hold ownership of safety and wellbeing for the mezzanine and roof area and are conducting daily stability and movement checks as part of the police health and safety plan for this incident.

Please note that at no time are any FENZ staff entering the building without the support of NZ Police.

COMMUNITY RELIEF CONSIDERATIONS FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THIS PLAN

If relief/recovery activities are commenced effectively and in a timely manner, these can have the greatest impact on the long-term wellbeing and return to normality for individuals and communities affected by an incident. Economic Environment: Is the restriction of movement and trade going to have a significant impact on business owners/local economy? Were the structures affected of regional or national economic significance (employers, producers/manufacturers)? What assistance could FENZ give to small business/owner-operators to continue to conduct their business?

Social Environment: Who is impacted by this event and how severely? What services or assistance may be offered, and how can these onward referrals be actioned by FENZ? Who are the community champions or natural leaders? What opportunities exist for engagement in pro-active comms around risk and long-term impact? What are the communication channels currently in use (local networks) and how might these be maintained post-event? How has the event changed living/working situations for the community? Have fire risk behaviours changed?

Cultural Lens: Are there cultural or religious values and customs which need to be considered or respected during recovery and post-event resilience activities? Are there specific post-event fire risk behaviours which are associated with culture, custom, ethnicity, religion which may need mitigation/education efforts? What engagement activities may need to occur post-response to restore Mauri Ora?

Rural (Agricultural) Lens: How do the priorities of this community in relation to lifeline service restoration or psychological support differ from an urban environment? What impact might animal welfare risks/issues have on the resilience and wellbeing of this community? What long term affects might physical or psychological isolation (as a result of a fire/hazard event) have on the community in terms of economic/job prospects, risk exposure, and/or disaster migration?

BRIEF SUMMARY OF INCIDENT

Community Relief Coordinator to populate

On Tuesday 16th May 2023 at 0025hrs, FENZ was alerted to a structure fire that had broken out at Loafers Lodge in Newtown, Wellington. Firefighters immediately dispatched to the scene, where they found a well involved fire on the top floor. The fire was quickly escalated to fifth alarm and involved 20 appliances on scene by 0400hrs. Evacuation process was undertaken for the building and nearby properties – this also involved roof rescues off the top of the building using ariel appliance. Necessary safety measures, including road closure of Adelaide Road was put in place to secure the area, and power was impacted in the area as electricity to the building was isolated. Residents in the surrounding area were advised to stay inside with windows and door closed due to smoke.

In the early hours of Tuesday morning, as crews continued to fight the fire, the residents of the building who were evacuated were taken to an EAC set up by WCC at Newtown Park. Crews continued to work on fighting the fire throughout the day on Tuesday and tragically, multiple fatalities were confirmed. At the EAC, various local agencies supported residents by providing psychosocial support and completed needs assessments for those affected. FENZ provided 3 CRR staff as Liaisons present at the EAC mainly working with Police and WCC. GM also also attended the EAC to provide key updates to Police from the fireground.

MSD provided immediate financial relief including phones to residents affected. Police on scene at the EAC recorded which residents were accounted for and completed interviews with residents. Wellington Free provided replacement prescriptions to residents. FENZ Media team provided updates to the public through external channels regarding the incident, including clarification of advice for the public regarding asbestos in the area which was shared with partner agencies at the EAC. WCC provided emergency housing for those residents who were at the EAC with nowhere else to go. The EAC was stood down once everyone was housed in the evening of Tuesday 16th May.

A total of 29 crews attended the incident in total and, as of Tuesday 16th May, systems were being put in place by the Safety Health and Wellbeing team to support those firefighters who attended. USAR squad was on site assessing the structural integrity of the building before fire investigations could gain access to the building on Wednesday 17th May. FENZ continues to support Police with investigations and as at 1430hrs on Wednesday 17th May, Police are the lead agency of the incident as the investigation continues, including confirming whereabouts of those who remain unaccounted for.

- Offer support to schools in the area who would have been impacted on the day of the incident by air quality concerns, visuals of the incident, and exposure to media. Explore the option of linking this support to Ahikura and Get Firewise programmes.

As you are all aware, in the early hours of Tues morning, a fire broke out in the Loafers Lodge, Newtown, which went to a 5th alarm at the height of firefighting operations.

Operational crews did an amazing job to rescue the large number of occupants that survived this horrendous incident, but unfortunately a number of occupants have also lost their lives. Following conversations with Operational OICs and firefighters, our staff went above and beyond in their tactics and efforts rescuing these people, putting themselves at risk to achieve this.

On Tues morning, we put together a SFI group (myself, and and to assist the NZ Police in the ongoing investigation. This team was later joined by

With all occupants being relocated the Newtown Park Pavilion, attended to become the FENZ point of contact, assist the occupants and supporting Social Services in the start of the recovery process and start gaining occupant numbers and names.

Today, the SFI team split into two teams, in order to assist police with the recovery of two occupants, documenting the scene and conducting preliminary investigations. The remaining occupants will hopefully be removed tomorrow in the same manner. We have made the decision (through management/Police meeting and Team discussion) to keep the current team through completion of this incident to ensure minimal exposure to the scene and continuity for the Police Investigation.

would like to personally thank all of our Team for coming together so rapidly to support in all aspects of this incident including delivery of gear/resources, staff wellbeing, continuation and follow up of BAU across the District, recovery, relieving SFI, phone call check ins with the SFI team etc.....the list goes on!!

It is perceived this incident / investigation could continue for up to another week, with plans put in place to ensure our SFI team are to be rotated regularly with stand down time.

Incidence like this have the ability to affect staff one way or another and not just the SFI team. I would like to remind all staff, that my phone is always on for a private chat, as I'm sure we can all

1. Background

Fire and Emergency attended a 5th alarm structure fire at the Loafers Lodge hostel in the early hours of Tuesday 16th May. The fire resulted in multiple fatalities despite the valiant and brave efforts of the Communications Centre team and the 29 crews and Commanders who responded to the incident.

2. Purpose

To support the wellbeing of our people as they process the incident and ensure their wellbeing need are meet.

3. Objectives

- Empower our people to access support and have access to support options that meet their needs
- Be upfront with our people through open and honest communication to ensure all personnel feel supported by FENZ
- Work together with our Unions and Associations to provide assurance that the wellbeing needs of our people will be looked after.

4. Initial actions (24-36 hours)

- Identify all personnel involved in initial response to the incident.
- Organise visits with Communications Centre personnel
- Debrief with Officer group of responding crews
- Liaise with Community Risk Team
- Liaise with Unions and Associations
- Liaise with partner agencies
- Identify any personnel languishing and/or showing acute signs of distress post the fire and link to appropriate wellbeing support.
- Provide assurance to all personnel of the fantastic job they did through internal and external communications.
- Mobilise peer support
- Identify any cultural needs or customs that need to be meet
- Provided briefing to employee assistance provider





You will all be well aware of the significant fatal fire which occurred at Loafers Lodge in Adelaide Rd, early yesterday morning.

Many of you attended, and while this was an immensely tragic incident, because of your direct actions more than 50 people escaped or were rescued. You did an incredible job under the most trying and challenging circumstances any Firefighter or Comcen operator would face. The Prime Minister and Minister of Internal Affairs visited the incident ground later yesterday morning and on your behalf I accepted their sincere gratitude and appreciation for your commitment and the significant work you undertook. This was a deeply sad day, but please remember those who are here today, because of your actions.

I want to also give you an update on the current situation and what the next steps will be.

Over the next two days, we will release our Recovery Plan for this incident. This will outline our priorities and a workplan for how these will be achieved. This plan will focus on three key priorities:

- 1. Supporting the psychological and welfare needs of District and Comcen personnel
- 2. Operational debriefing
- 3. Incident ground site management

Steph has informed me you are the leading the investigation response into the Adelaide Road fire.

As a subject expert I want to make sure FENZ is meeting its compliance obligations.

We need to set up compliance investigation protocols with all the other agencies involved in the Adelaide Road fire.

Can I please arrange a meeting with you to discuss how this is going to be managed.

All agencies are going to have their own requirements and the evidence is going to be needed by those multiple agencies. So you know I have already been approached by the Local Crown solicitor to provide guidance if required. I will work with them and over this investigation.

Conflict of interest. Has consideration been given as to who is doing the scene examination as potentially there could be criticism aimed at FENZ and especially towards the local Risk reduction staff. For this reason we should be giving consideration to using out of region staff to carry this important work out. This would help reduce any implied conflict of interest in local staff investigating themselves.

Coordinated approach. We only get one crack at the scene examination so we need the FENZ team to collect evidence to court standards as there is a lot that we need to get from the scene. This is bigger than a standard origin cause investigation.

Information sharing . We need to make sure we have information sharing arrangements with other agencies. I suggest an investigation MOU. This will help prevent misunderstanding in the near future

I am currently in doing a presentation with but I am happy to travel Wellington to discuss I cannot stress how important this is.



You will all be well aware of the significant fatal fire which occurred at Loafers Lodge in Adelaide Rd, early yesterday morning.

Many of you attended, and while this was an immensely tragic incident, because of your direct actions more than 50 people escaped or were rescued. You did an incredible job under the most trying and challenging circumstances any Firefighter or Comcen operator would face. The Prime Minister and Minister of Internal Affairs visited the incident ground later yesterday morning and on your behalf I accepted their sincere gratitude and appreciation for your commitment and the significant work you undertook. This was a deeply sad day, but please remember those who are here today, because of your actions.

I want to also give you an update on the current situation and what the next steps will be.

Over the next two days, we will release our Recovery Plan for this incident. This will outline our priorities and a workplan for how these will be achieved. This plan will focus on three key priorities:

- 1. Supporting the psychological and welfare needs of District and Comcen personnel
- 2. Operational debriefing
- 3. Incident ground site management

Take care and I will update on further details as they come to hand.

Fleet and our maintenance provider have not been notified of any "labouring" issues with the Type 4 or any other appliances at the incident. FYI by design the appliance gives priority to the pump when both the pump and aerial are engaged. This means that when both are engaged and the pump is idling with low engine revs the aerial will operate slower than when the engine is revving at the optimal level for the aerial alone. Perhaps that scenario occurred, which could give the impression of the engine labouring. This is not a fault but simply how the appliance is designed to operate and how it has operated since it was built.

The only issue we have had reported with the Type 4 was that a buzzer or other warning sound was heard from the Type 4 at one point and we understand that the crew turned the truck or aerial off and back on and the noise did not reoccur. The Type 4 has buzzers to alert the operator when required, and a manually operated signal 'horn'. The presence of a buzzer or warning is not necessarily indicative of a fault and the on-site mechanic checked the appliance (after the crew had restarted the truck so the buzzer was not going when the mechanic was at the appliance) and could not see any issue. The Type 4 remains in service and no faults for this appliance are currently logged with the fleet maintenance provider.

FYI there was also a reported issue with the Thorndon Type 5 mid-morning (business hours) Tuesday. The appliance was on site at the Newtown fire and the crew were packing up the appliance to shift it to another location when the boom stopped just above the fully housed position. People from the Fleet team went to the site and housed the boom using the bleed down function on the aerial. No specialist tools were used, just the built-in appliance functionality. A lot of water was on the appliance including around the operating joysticks (the crew advised they had been operating in very heavy rain at times that morning), and when the legs were housed a lot of water was seen to come out of one leg housing (right rear). The aerial

was then tested and worked without error. The crew then relocated the appliance and recommenced their work. No further issues have been reported at this stage and the appliance remains in service.





- 1. Our fire investigators will conduct the usual origin and cause investigation. Done by Wellington District tam but with direct support from our NHQ investigation team to coordinate for me)
- 2. In liaison with the Wellington DM operational Assurance will facilitate the formal debrief(s) they may need to be held in several locations around Wellington.
- 3. Operational Assurance will also facilitate a command debrief with all officers in key roles during the fire eg first arriving SSO and SO, first arriving GM's, Both IC's.
- 4. Fire Safety component this will involve an in depth look at our history with the building, a PIA(post incident analysis) conducted by the Fire Engineers to understand how the building behaved in the fire, how safety systems worked or not etc
- 5. Operational Assurance will conduct an operational review based on the ToR agreed by the RM and GM (standard practice) looking at command and control, equipment, appliance performance with a report showing findings only unless agreed otherwise.
- 6. Coordinate with police to ensure we stay in our lane and support their investigation as required. I will reach out to find who I need to work with on this.

So I will formulate this into a better described plan. Please note I am on leave tomorrow (Thursday).

Wellbeing Plan - Loafers Lodge Hostel

May 2023



1. Background

Fire and Emergency attended a 5th alarm structure fire at the Loafers Lodge hostel in the early hours of Tuesday 16th May. The fire resulted in multiple fatalities despite the valiant and brave efforts of the Communications Centre team and the 29 crews and Commanders who responded to the incident.

2. Purpose

To support the wellbeing of our people as they process the incident and ensure their wellbeing need are meet.

3. Objectives

- Empower our people to access support and have access to support options that meet their needs
- Be upfront with our people through open and honest communication to ensure all personnel feel supported by FENZ
- Work together with our Unions and Associations to provide assurance that the wellbeing needs of our people will be looked after.

4. Initial actions (24-36 hours)

- Identify all personnel involved in initial response to the incident.
- Organise visits with Communications Centre personnel
- Debrief with Officer group of responding crews
- Liaise with Community Risk Team
- Liaise with Unions and Associations
- Liaise with partner agencies
- Identify any personnel languishing and/or showing acute signs of distress post the fire and link to appropriate wellbeing support.

As you will already be aware, at 00:25 this morning Fire and Emergency received a call to Loafers Lodge, 160 Adelaide Road, Mount Cook, Wellington.

On arrival, 2 minutes and 19 seconds after receipt of the call, firefighters found the building to be on fire with a rapidly escalating and serious incident which reached a '5th Alarm'.

The building has been described as transient accommodation and housed a broad spectrum of people over its history.

The building has been well known to firefighters and has been the scene of many fire calls over the years.

As a result of this incident there have been an unconfirmed number of fatalities, currently in the single digits and several people transported to hospital with statuses of moderate to serious.

The investigation by Wellington Specialist Fire Investigators is in its early stages and being assisted by a Senior Specialist Fire Investigator from the Fire Research and Investigation Unit from National Headquarters.

The investigation is in its early stages and is expected to take some days and involve various sectors of Police, USAR and other agencies.

I am unable to provide information as to whether this is an avoidable residential fire fatality or what impact this will have on the total number of fire fatalities at this time.

Updates will be circulated once information comes to hand and is confirmed as accurate.

As the Police are the Lead Agency requests for information should be referred to them.




Hi all

Kia ora

Things to consider in the investigation to the Adelaide Road incident.

The offences listed below are all breaches of Fire and Emergency legislation that will most likely fall outside the scope of any Police investigation.

Some of the offences will fall away quite quickly

but should be taken into account during the scene examination

if you could please ask you investigators to keep an eye out for evidence against these sections while conducting their origin and cause investigation. As previously discussed I believe they should enter the site under both 70 (2)(b)&(c) to make sure we are completely covered. Wee should then execute a search warrant should they find anything.

We probably need to talk to the Police and come up with an operational MOU about evidence sharing to cover off where there maybe (unlikely) conflicts over the evidence each organisation requires.

There are a large number of Victims and hopefully the Police will have that phase of the investigation covered, but we will need to know who they are and have access to their initial interviews for preparation of victim impact statements if we end up taking a prosecution. It would be good to have a permanent liaison person with the Police

From what I can ascertain the building is owned by Loafers Lodge Limited and the company has one director and one share holder. The shareholder appears to be deceased so company is owned by his estate. This means we can potentially only hold the company to account as the owner. There are other offence that may or may not have committed by tenants or occupiers who also could victims. Their culpability can be determined through and thorough investigation. I will take advice from Megan on this but there could be a danger that the company may cease trading which will leave nothing for us to follow up with. However there maybe something around the role of a Director that means we could look at their culpability. I will need legal advice on that.

Fire and Emergency New Zealand (Fire Safety, Evacuation Procedures, and Evacuation Schemes) Regulations 2018

5 Owner and tenants of building must maintain means of escape from fire for building

- (1) The owner and every tenant of a building must maintain the means of escape from fire for the building so as to ensure that—
 - (a) the means of escape are kept clear of obstacles at all times; and
- (b) exit doors are unlocked and free of barriers or blockages so that the building's occupants can leave the building in the event of a fire emergency; and
- (c) smoke-control and fire-stop doors are kept closed unless they are kept open in a way that complies with the building code; and
 - (d) stairwells and passageways are free of stored items and accumulation of waste

 - (a) provide for the occupants to be evacuated to a place or places of safety; and
- (b) without limiting paragraph (a), provide for the safety of any person who requires particular assistance.
- (3) The owner of a building must ensure that information about the evacuation procedure is readily available to the building's occupants, including information about—
 - (a) the routes of travel to the place or places of safety for the building; and
- (b) the fire alarm signals or other methods that are used for alerting occupants or that are available for use by the occupants; and
 - (c) any firefighting equipment that is available for use by the occupants; and
 - (d) the provision for any person who requires particular assistance; and
 - (e) how to alert FENZ to a fire emergency.
- (4) The owner of a building must erect clear, distinct, and legible signs and notices at appropriate places in the building that clearly summarise the specified in subclause (3) (a) to (e).
- (5) Without limiting subclause (4), the signs and notices required by that subclause must comply with the following requirements:
- (a) the signs and notices must have a safety blue background and a white border; and
 - (b) lettering on the safety blue background must be white; and
 - (c) printed lettering on the signs and notices must be no less than 5 mm high; and
- (d) any spaces on the signs or notices that are designed to contain hand-written information must be white and at least 10 mm high.
- (6) The place or places of safety for a building that is a relevant building must meet the requirements of <u>regulation 26</u>.

- (1) The owner and the occupants of a building must take reasonable fire prevention precautions in relation to—
- (a) electrical wiring, equipment, and appliances, including portable electrical equipment and appliances; and
- (b) as reticulation systems, equipment, and appliances, including portable gas reticulation equipment and appliances; and
- (c) equipment and appliances fuelled by flammable liquids (for example, kerosene), including portable equipment and appliances.
- (2) Any appliance that gives an open flame or is fuelled by a flammable liquid or gas must not be used in a building unless the appliance is constructed, secured, and protected in a manner that minimises the risk of fire to the building and its contents.

11 Control of open flames

- (1) No fire may be lit in a building other than in—
- (a) a fireplace that complied, at the time of its construction, with the building code and any bylaw or other relevant legal requirement and is maintained in proper repair; or
 - (b) an appliance maintained in proper repair.
- (2) No chimney may be used in a building unless the chimney—
 - (a) is constructed for the purpose; and
- (b) complied, at the time of its construction, with the building code and any bylaw or other relevant legal requirement; and
- (c) is properly maintained.
- (3) For the purposes of subclause (2), **chimney** includes any flue, vent, or stove pipe installed or provided to allow the escape of smoke, fumes, heat, and other products of combustion.

12 Packing and unpacking of goods

- (1) The packing or unpacking of goods packaged in straw, paper, wood-wool, or other flammable material may be undertaken in a building only in places—
 - (a) where the public is not permitted; and
- (b) that are not directly connected to any stairway, liftwell, or other opening between floors that is not protected against the spread of fire, smoke, or fumes; and
- (c) in which there is no lighting or heating device that may be used in a manner that could cause the packaging to ignite; and
 - (d) where smoking is not permitted.
- (2) Flammable packaging materials used in a building must be kept, outside of working hours,—
 - (a) away from the building; or
 - (b) in non-combustible containers with close-fitting lids in the building; or
 - in a building that complies with <u>regulation 13</u>.

13 Storage of certain materials inside and outside buildings

- (1) A building must not be primarily used for the storage of 1 or more of the materials described in subclause (5), unless the building is located in such a position that any fire in it cannot spread to any nearby building or to any road or other public place.
- (2) If a part of a building is primarily used for the storage of 1 or more of the materials described in subclause (5), it must be protected in such a way that any fire cannot spread to the

rest of the building or any nearby building or to any road or other public place.

- (3) If a building or part of a building is primarily used for the storage of 1 or more of the materials described in subclause (5), the materials may be stored only in places that are as described in regulation 12(1)(b) to (d).
- (4) No materials described in subclause (5) may be stored outside a building in a way that creates a fire hazard to the building, another building, or to any road or other public place.
- (5) The materials are—
 - (a) timber:
 - (b) firewood or other wooden materials:
 - (c) hay, straw, or other dry plant cuttings:
 - (d) flammable packaging materials:
 - (e) waste of a type that is likely to burn if lit:
 - (f) any other flammable material.

14 Maintenance of firefighting equipment for use by building's occupants

The owner of any hand-operated firefighting equipment installed in a building for firefighting by the building's occupants must maintain it in accordance with NZS 4503:2005—Hand operated fire-fighting equipment.

Fire and Emergency New Zealand Act 2017

60 Causing or allowing fire to get out of control and to spread

- (1) A person must not cause or allow a fire to get out of control and to spread to vegetation or property.
- (2) Subsection (1) does not apply to a person who, as soon as practicable after discovering the fire, notifies FENZ.
- A person commits an offence if the person knowingly or recklessly contravenes subsection (1).
- (4) A person who commits an offence under this section is liable on conviction,—
- (a) in the case of an individual, to a term of imprisonment not exceeding 2 years or a fine not exceeding \$300,000, or both; or
 - (b) in any other case, to a fine not exceeding \$600,000

76 Owner must provide and maintain evacuation scheme for relevant building

- (1) The owner of a relevant building must provide an evacuation scheme that is designed to enable evacuation from the scene of a fire or an alarm of fire safely to a place of safety within a reasonable time.
- (2) The owner of a relevant building must maintain an evacuation scheme that has been approved by FENZ under section 77.
- (3) However, the owner of a relevant building is not required to provide or maintain an evacuation scheme for the building if—
- (a) the building is used only for either or both of the purposes specified in section. 75(1)(a)(ii) and (iii); and
 - (b) the building has an automatic sprinkler system; and
- (c) the owner of the relevant building notifies FENZ, in writing and in the prescribed form (if any), that the building does not require an evacuation scheme.
- (4) A person who knowingly contravenes subsection (1) or (2) commits an offence and is liable on conviction,—
- (a) in the case of an individual, to a term of imprisonment not exceeding 6 months or to a fine not exceeding \$75,000, or both:
 - (b) in any other case, to a fine not exceeding \$150,000.






