## Background

- Te Ropu was established in 2011 by the Commission Board (the Board) to ensure that partnership with Maori was demonstrated at the governance level.
- 4. Te Rōpū advise the Board and Chief Executive on strategic issues and priorities (and provide operational advice where required) with regards to health quality and safety that relate specifically to whānau, hapū, and lwi Māori, to contribute to the goal of achieving health equity for Māori and for the benefit of all New Zealanders.
- 5. Te Rōpū proactively identify where and when a Māori world view or approach can be used in the design and implementation of quality improvement initiatives.

#### **Terms of Reference**

- 6. The Terms of Reference (TOR) have recently been revised and presented to the Board in November 2021. The TOR are attached as Appendix One.
- The TOR has been updated to:
  - 1. ensure they are "fit for purpose"
  - 2. include a set of Kaupapa Tuku lho values that are commonly used to support Māori specific advisory groups today.

## Membership

- 8. Te Rōpū consists of eight Māori health sector experts who are networked, known, respected and knowledgeable about issues and priorities for whānau, hāpu and lwi Māori in regard to advancing Māori health and achieving health equity.
- 9. The Board of the Commission appoints the Chairperson of Te Ropū.
- 10. The Commission Chief Executive, in consultation with the Executive Leadership Team and the Chair of Te Ropū or other advisors as required, appoint members to Te Ropū Māori.
- 11. One of the membership seats is reserved specifically for a Māori consumer and/or whanau representation and one of the membership seats is reserved for Mortality Review Committee representation.
- 12. Te Röpū membership has declined over the past six months due to illness, new work commitments and availability. This leaves four spaces needing to be filled.

  - 4. Dr Matire Harwood


- 15. Muriel Tunoho was appointed as a representative of CAG and was a joint member of both groups. Muriel has resigned from CAG and asked to remain a member of Te Rōpū. CAG has been approached to propose a Māori consumer and/or whanau representation as a joint CAG / Te Rōpū member.

## Te Röpū name

- 17. There has been considerable discussion about the appropriateness and context of the name 'Te Rōpū. The discussion has centred on developing a new name that gives greater context to the function and direction of Te Rōpū. It is worth noting that Te Rōpū is largely internally focused rather than having an externally focused role.
- 18. The following process will be used to develop, consider and agree any changes to the name 'Te Rōpū'
  - 1. Meet with key advisors to discuss the concept of Te Ropū
  - 2. Propose possible name choices
  - 3. Decide name choice
  - 4. Agree name choice with the Board
  - 5. Socialise name choice

#### Health system reforms

- 19. Currently the health system is going through significant change and reform. These changes are impacting on the Te Ropu agenda resulting in:
  - an increase in focus on areas pertaining to Māori within the new system and structures
  - 2. increased connection with Te Aka Whai Ora (Māori Health Authority) where the issue of whanau voice is under discussion
  - 3. ongoing requests for support and advice
- 20. Given these changes it is proposed that:
  - Meeting frequency is increased from four meetings per annum to six meetings per annum to provide a greater time platform to fully discuss arising issues within the context of the reforms and to be able to provide great advice to the Board
  - Te Ropū secretariat will be increased to support the increased demand.

Ria Earp introduced the paper to support the shaping and refreshing of Te Ropū including new terms of reference and proposed new memberships.

There was general agreement that Te Rōpū could make their own membership decisions and should ensure they have appropriate processes in place around appointments and conflict of interests.

The board noted that times have changed since Te Rōpū was first established and indicated a desire to see Te Rōpū work alongside them in a partnership capacity, rather than being an advisory group. The board requested advise to provide clarity on the terms of reference and how these should be managed in the changing context.

## Action: The board requested:

- advice on appropriate approval process for terms of reference that would support Te Rōpū to work alongside them in a partnership capacity
- that Te Ropū provide clarity on their process of interests' disclosure and managing conflicts.



The Chair thanked Janice and staff for providing very contemporary views and advice, and commended the work.

The meeting closed at 12.10am with a karakia by Stephanie Turner.
