I refer to your information request dated 3 August 2024 made under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act). You have requested mark and grade distributions for all 2021-2023 PXSS papers offered by the University of Otago.

Subject to the following comments, please see attached the information you have requested. Please note there are three pages in the attached spreadsheet.

- the data is correct as at 23 August 2024.
- on occasions where fewer than five students have failed a paper (i.e. received a grade of Fail D, Fail E, Failed Compulsory Assessment or Failed Terms), we have determined that it is necessary to withhold the marks and specific grades for these students to protect their privacy and wellbeing. We consider that withholding this information is necessary to protect against the identity of these students being determined or inferred, and their personal information (i.e. their marks) could be disclosed. We therefore withhold this information pursuant to section 9(2)(a) of the Act.
- on occasions where fewer than ten students are enrolled in a paper, we determine that it is necessary
 to withhold the mark and grade distributions for these papers. As there were fewer than ten
 enrolments in the 2021 CHTH324 paper and the 2022 CHTH337, LAWS480 and RELS303 papers,
 we have withheld the mark and grade distribution for this paper to protect students' privacy and
 wellbeing. We consider that withholding this information is necessary to protect against the identity
 of these students being determined or inferred, and their personal information (i.e., their marks and
 grades) could be disclosed. We therefore withhold this information pursuant to section 9(2)(a) of the
 Act.
- please note that not the papers offered during PXSS can differ each year, therefore we have only provided mark and grade breakdowns for the years that specific papers were offered.
- in the attached grade and mark distributions, we note that students who withdrew from the papers are excluded from the data.

I trust that this information will be helpful.

In the above cases, we consider that good reasons exist for withholding information, and this is not outweighed by other considerations which would make it desirable, in the public interest, to make the information available.

If you are not satisfied with our response to your information request, section 28(3) of the Act provides you with the right to ask an Ombudsman to investigate and review this response. However, we would welcome the opportunity to discuss any concerns with you first.
