On 5 April 2017, you emailed the Ministry for Vulnerable Children, Oranga Tamariki requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act), the following information:

- 1) How many women did CYFS (now MVC) offer to pay for sterilization in 2014, 15, 16?
- 2) How many women did CYFS (now MVC) pay to have sterilized in 2014, 15, 16?
- 3) How many of the women received their children back after being sterilized in 2014, 2015, 2016?
- 4) How many Home for Life placements did CYFS (now MVC) perform in 2014, 15, 16?
- 5) How many women signed orders/papers allowing their future children to be taken from birth/ releasing future parental responsibility at birth by CYFS (now MVC) in 2014, 15, 16?
- 6) How many uplifts during child's first month of life did CYFS (now MVC) perform in 2014, 15, 16?
- 7) How many uplifts while child and mother were in hospital did CYFS (now MVC) perform in 2014, 15, 16? of these how many were performed under Court Order?
- 8) How many COT/CIDS deaths have occurred in babies under 3 years of age while in CYFS (now MVC) care in 2014, 15, 16?

On 8 April 2017, you also requested:

- 9) How many suicides by children in the care of CYFS (now MVC) were there during 2014, 15, 16?
- 10) Can I have statistics on numbers of those who made notifications of abuse to CYFS (now MVC) where they were then investigated themselves in 2014, 15, 16? Can I have those statistics on Gender and relationship to child.

For all ten questions, you requested the statistics be provided at a national level as well as being broken down to a regional level and to specific branches for the following areas:

- Lower Hutt,
- Upper Hutt,
- South Auckland,
- Onehunga,
- Tauranga,
- Palmerston North,
- · Christchurch offices.

On 5 May 2017, the Ministry advised more time was required to prepare a response to your requests and that a decision would be with you by 18 June 2017. A notification of decision was sent to you on Monday 19 June 2017, advising that we would grant your request in part.

For clarity, each of your questions have been addressed in turn.

- 1) How many women did CYFS (now MVC) offer to pay for sterilization in 2014, 15, 16?
- 2) How many women did CYFS (now MVC) pay to have sterilized in 2014, 15, 16?
- 3) How many of the women received their children back after being sterilized in 2014, 2015, 2016?

The Ministry and the former Child, Youth and Family do not, and have not, paid for the sterilisation of women. As such, your request for this information is refused under section 18(e) of the Act, as this information does not exist.

The Ministry for Social Development has a Special Needs Grant available through Work and Income to help clients with the additional costs of accessing subsidised long-acting reversible contraception (LARC). These grants do not need to be paid back. 4) How many Home for Life placements did CYFS (now MVC) perform in 2014, 15, 16?

A permanent living arrangement gives tamariki (the child) a stable environment in which to grow up but, more than this, it gives them relationships for life which are enduring, secure and nurturing. - 5) How many women signed orders/papers allowing their future children to be taken from birth/ releasing future parental responsibility at birth by CYFS (now MVC) in 2014, 15, 16?

On 15 April 2017, you provided further detail about what you were requesting in question five:

- While interviewing several mothers dealing with the Palmerston North Branch in particular, however I have heard similar from other branches, these mothers have reported signing a legal document stating that all further children as yet unborn will become the direct responsibility/care of CYFS from the time of birth, and give permission for CYFS to uplift any further, as yet, future possible children at birth.
- Many have thought this was a legal document however if not can you please clarify in addition to the original Request please.

The document you reference, as 'signed orders', is not a document that the Ministry is aware of as being in existence. As such, your request for this information is refused under section 18(e) of the Act, as this information does not exist.

- 6) How many uplifts during child's first month of life did CYFS (now MVC) perform in 2014, 15, 16?
- 7) How many uplifts while child and mother were in hospital did CYFS (now MVC) perform in 2014, 15, 16? of these how many were performed under Court Order?

The decision to place a child or young person in an Oranga Tamariki residence or supervised group home, or with a service provider is never one that is made lightly. In these situations the child or young person will likely have complex needs that can't be met by our caregivers or by their family/whānau, and they may require extra support and oversight to keep them safe. It is important that when our children and young people are in these types of placements we don't lose sight of them or their specific needs, and we keep on track with planning for their future. The Ministry is unable to provide you with information about whether an uplift occurred while the child and mother were in hospital as that information is held in notes on individual case files. In order to provide you with data, Ministry staff would have to manually review thousands of files. As such, your request is refused under section 18(f) of the Act, as the information cannot be provided without substantial manual collation and research. The greater public interest is in the effective and efficient administration of the public service.

I have considered whether the Ministry would be able to respond to your request given extra time, or the ability to charge for the information requested. I have concluded that, in either case, the Ministry's ability to undertake its work would still be prejudiced.

There are different court orders that have the effect of placing a child or young person in the care of the Chief Executive. It is important for the child or young person's social worker to understand the rights, powers and responsibilities that are applicable to each order and what is required of them as the delegated representative of the Chief Executive. 8) How many COT/CIDS deaths have occurred in babies under 3 years of age while in CYFS (now MVC) care in 2014, 15, 16?

Information about the Ministry's policy for safe sleeping environments for children in the custody of the Chief Executive and information regarding Sudden Unexpected Death in Infancy (SUDI) can be found online at: https://practice-mvcot.ssi.govt.nz/policy/caring-for-children-and-young-people/resources/safe-sleep.html

The Ministry recorded no deaths from SUDI in 2014 and 2015. In 2016, there was one SUDI death of a child in the care of the Chief Executive. In order to protect the identity of the individual, the site and region of the one related to this death is withheld in part under section 9(2)(a) of the Act. The need to protect the privacy of this individual and their family outweighs any public interest in this information.

For the answers to question eight and nine, it is worthwhile noting that custody or care of the Chief Executive is defined in section 9 of the Coroners Act 2006. On 8 April 2017, you also requested:

9) How many suicides by children in the care of CYFS (now MVC) were there during 2014, 15, 16?

Tragically, a small number of children and young people die while in the custody of the Chief Executive. When a child or young person involved with the Ministry, dies as a result of suicide or homicide, the Office of the Chief Social Worker examines each case and provides a report to the Deputy Chief Executive of the Ministry as well as to the Children's Commissioner who acts as an independent monitor of the Ministry.

Young people we work with often have a complex range of issues, so it's important we're vigilant and responsive to potential suicide risk. A recent review identified two relatively distinct groups of young people at risk of committing suicide:

- those with highly complex needs, with significant histories with us, who are identified as at risk
- those who are not well known to us, have little history with us, but go on to commit suicide.

I can advise that between 2014 and 2015, there were no confirmed suicides. However, there are three suspected suicide deaths of children and young people in the care of the Chief Executive that are under investigation by the Coroner. Please note that the Coroner is yet to release findings of the deaths to confirm the suicides. In 2016, no child or young person died by way of suicide while in the care of the Chief Executive.

In order to protect the identities of the individuals, the site and region information is withheld in part under section 9(2)(a) of the Act. The need to protect the privacy of these individuals and their families outweighs any public interest in this information.

10) Can I have statistics on numbers of those who made notifications of abuse to CYFS (now MVC) where they were then investigated themselves in 2014, 15, 16? Can I have those statistics on Gender and relationship to child.

The Ministry is unable to provide you with this information as it is held in notes on individual case files. In order to provide you with data relating to notifications of abuse, Ministry staff would have to manually review thousands of files. As such, your request is refused under section 18(f) of the Act. The greater public interest is in the effective and efficient administration of the public service.

I have considered whether the Ministry would be able to respond to your request given extra time, or the ability to charge for the information requested. I have concluded that, in either case, the Ministry's ability to undertake its work would still be prejudiced.

The principles and purposes of the Official Information Act 1982 under which you made your request are:

- to create greater openness and transparency about the plans, work and activities of the Government,
- to increase the ability of the public to participate in the making and administration of our laws and policies and
- to lead to greater accountability in the conduct of public affairs.

This Ministry fully supports those principles and purposes. The Ministry therefore intends to make the information contained in this letter and any attached documents available to the wider public shortly. The Ministry will do this by publishing this letter and attachments on the Ministry's website. Your personal details will be deleted and the Ministry will not publish any information that would identify you as the person who requested the information.
