





### 2.6 Social Workers in Schools (SWiS) – evaluation findings

#### For information

- SWiS is a Government-funded community service available in most decile 1-3 primary and intermediate schools, and kura kaupapa Māori. Most students serviced by SWiS are Māori or Pacific.
- Oranga Tamariki and MSD have jointly carried out two quantitative evaluations of SWIS, both of which suggest that the service has positive outcomes in schools. However, these studies were limited in that they could not identify individual impacts on individual students.
- A briefing to the Minister of Social Development, requesting confirmation to use funds from the Ministerial Social Sector Research Fund for more in-depth qualitative research in advance of the transformation work, has been sent by MSD. The Ministerial Social Sector Research Fund was transferred from Superu to MSD late 2017.
- The result of the SWiS studies will inform a potential 2019 Budget Bid from Oranga Tamariki, to extend and transform SWiS.
- The Oranga Tameriki Evidence Centre and MSD will work collaboratively on this qualitative research.

#### 2.7 Residence Graffiti Free' Refresh

#### For information

On 19 February, the Youth Justice and Care and Protection Residences are due to begin the 'Graffiti Free and Residential Environments Project'. Te Maioha Youth Justice Residence in Rotorua is the first residence to start the project. The aim of the project is to continue to create comfortable, safe, and supportive environments for our tamariki placed in a residence.

• The project will complete this work for the Youth Justice Residences at Korowai and Te Puna Wai over the next four months. Subject to capital allocations for next financial year, the refresh work will be rolled out to all residences during 2018 and would finish with Te au Rere Youth Justice Residence. It is anticipated that, while a residence is having the refresh, at least 10 beds will be temporarily unavailable. A plan is in place to support the refresh and minimise the impact on the young people needing placements.

### 2.9 Partnership with Dunedin Site and Kingslea School

#### For information

- Puketai Care and Protection Residence and Kingslea School are trialling a pilot programme for local children who are transitioning out of residence, residing in the Dunedin Specialist Group Home (Te Pae Tawhiti) or involved with Orange Tamariki and their needs are not able to be met within other educational environments.
- The programme provides an individualised educational programme with a child centred pathway back into mainstream school or a community based educational course within a timeframe that allows flexibility to ensure the basic bance of success.
- The classroom uses a therapeutic approach where each student has an individualised programme that is based on student voice and identified needs. The classroom is open from 9am to 12pm, runby a reacher and teacher aide and has places for three students.
- There is a strong multi agency approach to supporting the students.
- The pilot commenced in term three 2017, initially with two local students. One of the students is transitioning back to a mainstream high school in term one of 2018. End of year results, attendance and student evaluation all indicated a very successful term and a half in the king slead ransition classroom.
- The classroom reopened on Monday 5 February with three local students.





These young people have been referred to us by trusted sources known to them as natural leaders who are passionate about helping shidren in care. Activity coordinators work with caregivers, social workers and local Regional Sports Trusts to ensure the children in the programme have what they need to engage in a sport and regreation activity of their choice. The young activity coordinators so far have enjoyed their induction and are being provided with continuous wrap-around support to ensure they have what they need to thrive in their roles. They will be with us for 6 months, during and after which we will work with them to identify their next steps. The findings from the current employment of these young people is informing thinking about what a wider supported employment package could be for young people transitioning from care. The Engaging all New Zealanders team is exploring ways for how Oranga Tamariki could encourage and support employers to provide work opportunities to young people, in conjunction with the Transition Support Service Design team and Voices of Children team.



### 2.6 The Oranga Tamariki (Parent's and Guardian's Responsibility) Amendment Bill

- The Oranga Tamariki (Parent's and Guardian's Responsibility) Amendment Bill was introduced to the house on 22 February. It is a Member's Bill by Barbara Kuriger (National).
- The Bill gives Youth Court Judges the ability to impose conditions on the parents or guardians
  of young persons against whom a charge has been proved and who has been released on bail.
  It also provides for liability in situations where orders made by the Youth Court are not
  complied with. The conditions are:
  - requiring the parent or guardian to reside at a nominated addressed with the child or young person
  - o requiring the parent or guardian to observe a specified curfew;
  - o prohibiting the parent or guardian from consuming alcohol and drugs;
  - o prohibiting the parent or guardian from associating with any specified person;
  - o any other order the ludge considers necessary to ensure the on-going safety of the young person.
- Ahear of your theme session on Youth Justice, scheduled for 20 March, we will provide you with a report seeking agreement to review the provisions of the Oranga Tamariki Act relating to remand. The purpose of the review will be to ensure that the legislative provisions support the aim that children and young people alleged to have offended are kept in the community where practicable and in keeping with public safety. The issue around suitability of placement and patental guardian responsibility could fall within the remit of this broader work.







Four homes in Dunedin, Palmerston North, Waikite Valley and Rotorua have already been established since 1 April 2017. The achievement of a home in Te Tai Tokerau will fill a gap that has seen young people arrested in Northland remanded in custody to Auckland as there is currently no local

capability.

- The Remand Home Tendering Panel has completed their assessment of proposals and met with two potential providers. The recommended provider has indicated they would not require the home in Tainui Street, Onerahi, Whangarei that was consulted as a possible location.
- Operational and commercial arrangements to provide the service still need to be negotiated and it is intended to have the service available before the end of June 2018. The unsuccessful provider was advised on 9 March.

### 2.7 Youth Remand Trends Research

### For information

- The Evidence Centre has completed a research report that uses cross-sector data to examine the types of remand (ball, custody etc.) used for children and young people whose cases commenced in the Youth Court between 2011/12 and 2015/16.
- This research was commissioned following the Expert Advisory Panel final report which recommended reducing the number of young people remanded to a secure residence.
- The report shows that while bail was used in the vast majority of cases, there was a high level of breaching bail conditions and reoffending on bail which was contributing to the young people subsequently being detained in custody during the period of the research.
- The rates of remend in custody for young women were higher than their average seriousness of effending, compared to young men. This may be associated with complex case issues underpinning offending by young women.

Work is currently underway in Oranga Tamariki to investigate ways we can better support young people to be successful on bail.

Oranga Tamariki intends to publish the report later in March. We will provide you with an aide memoire and a copy of the research report by 16 March.

### 2.6 New education service for youth justice young people in community care

- Previously not all of the youth justice community youth homes in Auckland had access to
  education services. This includes the College Road Family Home on the North Shore which you
  visited on 26 January.
- As of this week, Tuilaepa Youth Mentoring Service (TYMS) will be providing education in all of

our community youth homes in Auckland.

- Education will be provided in the homes Monday to Friday, from 10am to 3pm.

## 2.7 Collaborating for success at Wellington site

- Staff at Wellington site have collaborated with several local government and NGO agencies to provide intensive and focused intervention support for two young people in care in extremely challenging circumstances. These two young people had been excluded from school due to serious behavioural concerns that were both challenging and risky.
- The site worked in partnership with the Ministry of Education, Wellstop Ngati Ki Poneke Social Services, Child and Mental Health Services and Challenge 2000. The framework for the delivery of each agency's service was the intensive Wrap Around programme which is coordinated by the Ministry of Education. Each agency committed significant resources and time to the programme.
- The individualised and intensive programmes are effective, and are based on a collaborative and coordinated model for transitioning tamariki back into the main stream education and supporting them to reach their individual education goals.
- The programme features:
  - o active involvement of the tamariki in the planning towards a goal
  - o positive engagement of whahau in developing and implementing the plan
  - o utilisation of a wide range of services to maintain and support the transitional plan and sustain the tamariki at a mainstream school.
- The collaboration between agencies has resulted in an effective plan that has proved successful. Tamariki were involved in the design, planning and implementation of the programme. The tamariki are on track for transitioning back into a school setting.


# Meeting with Ministerial Colleagues on Youth Justice As requested, we are preparing an engaging presentation on Oranga Tamariki's youth justice services in advance of a meeting currently being arranged with the Prime Minister and your youth justice ministerial colleagues. This includes raising the age of youth justice to include 17 year olds from 1 July 2019. The presentation will also provide an opportunity for Ministers to discuss further options for transforming not just the Ministry's youth justice services but also how wider system changes can support the work already in progress. # 1.2 Update on Social Workers Registration Legislation Bill

- Recent media attention has highlighted disagreements across the sector with regards to how a
  social worker is defined in the Social Workers Registration Legislation Bill. Organisations such
  as the Aotearoa New Zealand Association of Social Workers (ANZASW) are continuing to
  advocate for a social work score of praetice to be included in the Bill.
- The select committee has reported back to the House and the Bill is currently awaiting its second reading. We understand that this was initially expected to take place in May 2018, however the timing is yet to be confirmed as Minister Sepuloni is focused on meeting with various sector organisations.
- We have been advised that Winister Sepuloni has met with ANZASW and the PSA, to discuss
  the issue of definitions and scopes of practice and how it might be resolved. We will be
  meeting with MSD to follow-up any next steps in the process that we will need to be engaged
- We will provide you with further advice as it progresses.

#### 2.3 Kõrero mai pulse survey results update

- In October 2017 we ran our first staff engagement survey, "Korero Mai Have your say
- 63% of our staff completed the survey which identified three areas of focus for Oranga
  Tamariki at an organisational level:
  - o Living the Oranga Tamariki Way (an area of strength for the Ministry)
  - o Personal Development (an area that required improvement)
  - o Kaimahi ora staff wellbeing (area that required improvement)
- In December 2017, the Oranga Tamariki Leadership Team agreed to run a short, focussed pulse check survey to check in on how we are progressing against the three areas of focus identified above.
- In April 2018, we held the "Kōrero mai pulse check" survey which was completed by 61% our people.
- The pulse check survey had four questions, one for each focus area and a general question to assess if people had seen a positive change in the last 6 months.
- There was a positive increase in staff satisfaction for all four questions.
- The Oranga Tamariki Leadership team agreed to continue to focus efforts as an organisation on the areas of focus.
- We will re-validate those when we do another full survey later this year.





#### 2.4 24/7 Caregiver Guidance and Advice Line launch at the Oranga Tamariki Contact Centre

- On 14 May 2018, the 24/7 Caregiver Guidance and Advice Line and a Centralised Enquiry Team
  to support prospective caregivers was launched nationally at the Oranga Tamariki National
  Contact Centre (NCC).
- You are visiting the 24/7 Caregiver Guidance and Advice Line at the NCC on 28 May and we are drafting an aide-mémoire for you to support this visit.
- This has been an exciting piece of work and it has enabled a completely different approach to support our caregivers who look after some of our most at-risk tamariki.
- The line was developed to provide caregivers a dedicated phone support that would guarantee them a quick response and access to expert advice when they need it. Caregivers told us that having someone to call on whenever they need it could make all the difference. We know when our caregivers feel more supported to manage challenging behaviours they are better able to provide stable, loving homes for tameriki.
- In addition to the line, a Central Enquiries Team will be in place to manage all caregiver enquiries. The Team will also work together with sites to provide administration support for other new and existing caregiver applications.







### 1.8 Safe and Effective Justice Reform Summit

- The Minister for Justice has asked Officials to start a process of public engagement on the subject of Safe and Effective Justice reform, beginning with a two-day summit at Porirua on 21/22 August.
- We are engaged with other justice sector agencies in planning for the Summit. The Summit is
  intended to be the start of a longer conversation about how New Zealand wants to shape the
  future purpose and role of its Justice System, exhoing the Education Summits held in May.
- A draft Summit plan is with the Justice Minister for his consideration. While there is not an explicit youth justice theme for the Summit, several of the themes prevention, alternative justice pathways, new approaches to bail and remaind and supporting victims, will have youth justice aspects. Other workstreams proposed, such as successful reintegration after imprisonment, will be of interest due the impact on children of having a parent in prison.
- We will continue to engage with the agenda and planning for the Justice Summit. We will ensure any Summit issues impacting on youth justice will form part of the youth justice briefing for Ministers set for 5 July (ceterred to in the entry above).

  concern about the lack of funding available for crisis support services for children and young
  people affected by sexual violence. This advice was provided in relation to a piece of
  correspondence from Trevor Maxwell. Chairperson of the Bay of Plenty Community Response
  Forum.
- This issue was highlighted following the appropriation of funding for sexual harm crisis support services through Budget 2016 by the Ministry of Social Development (MSD), which specified that funding was for adult services only. The social Policy Cabinet Committee's indicated that children and young people would continue to receive crisis support services through (the then) Child, Youth and Family.
- Oranga Tamariki is responding to this issue and we are currently gaining a better
  understanding of the support required by children and young people in crisis due to sexual
  violence. From 1 July 2018, Oranga Tamariki will have in place draft service guidelines that
  cover the provision of a crisis response to children and young people, along with one-off
  contingency funding to support the delivery of a service. The new interim guidelines will sit
  alongside the existing Sexual Harm Crisis Support Service Guidelines for adult services
- This is an interior measure to allow time for Oranga Tamariki and the Ministry of Social Development to work together during 2018/19 to ensure an aligned and sustainable position is in place from 1 July 2020.

# 2. Updates

## 2.1 Incidental Expenditure Card

- Following a successful pilot, we are providing payment cards (referred to internally as incidental Expenditure Payment cards) to frontline staff who work directly with children. These will enable the purchase of low value items and services to support engagement with children.
- We have commenced roll out at two Oranga Tamariki sites; Palmerston North Youth Justice and Grey Lynn Care and Protection. These sites will receive and commence using their cards over the next fortnight.
- Roll out to the rest of sites commences mid-July and is expected to take six weeks.

  Deployment will be supported by learning modules, new policies and guidance material. These have been developed in a manner that ensures confident use of the cards.



- The need for emergency and short-term care for teenagers has been difficult to manage, and having this home open represents a truly tangible way in which Oranga Tamariki can provide safe care for this vulnerable group.
- A number of key stakeholders attended the opening.
- The warm and inviting rooms of the home reflect the young and vibrant vision that ESYT have for engaging and supporting young people in the home and wider community. Pictured below is one of the new rooms and artwork at the home.

### 2.6 The Mana Wahine Programme

- Palmerston North youth justice in partnership with Police Youth Aid and Best Care Whakapai Hauora are running the Mana Wahine Programme for up to six young women aged 14 to 17 years who are or have recently been involved with Oranga Tamariki.
- This eight week programme supports young women into independence by enhancing their emotional wellbeing, developing their basic life skills, and encouraging self-confidence and identity. The programme also focuses on enhancing the value of Whakamanawa (respect for self and others) and Whakaaroharoha (managing emotions).
- The objectives of the Mana Wahine programme are to:
  - o provide a safe place for expression an moemoea (dreams and aspirations);
  - o teach the wahine to build their mana, by providing them with tools, skills and knowledge;
  - o help address the underlying causes of their offending, through self-awareness, identity and self-worth; and
  - o to help the wahine to identify their own triggers and learn strategies to manage their behaviours and responses.
- The programme began on 18 May with a team puilding, whakawhanaungatanga' weekend and continues weekly on a Tuesday evening until graduation is celebrated in July.

# 2.7 Helping Taranaki become free of introduced predators by 2050

- START Taranaki is a 20 week programme for young males between the age of 15 to 17 years who are on either a youth justice "supervision with activity order" or "a supervision order" following a "supervision with residence order"
- START Taranaki has been participating in a local conservation project with 'Taranaki Mounga' (a local trust that is working toward the Government's vision of a predator free New Zealand by 2050).
- This project saw young men in the START programme build 60 traps and lay them out along hunters tracks in the Egmont National Park on 1 June, with the aim of eradicating stoats, rats and ferrots.
- This collaboration came about after the Taranaki Community Trust, which invests in both projects, thought they could benefit from working together.






# 1.1 **Annual Report on Monitoring of Places of Detention** The Human Rights Commission publish an annual report on monitoring of places of detention under the United Nations Optional Protocol to the Convention Against Torture (OPCAT). The Ministry of Justice is sending its Minister the OPCAT annual report this week and it is likely to be tabled in the House toward the end of next week or the week after. It is likely to be published soon after it is tabled. The Office of the Children's Commissioner's contribution to the annual report confirms the our residences are safe for children and young people and it identifies a number of strength's and some areas for development. In relation to the latter, the annual report also states that as part of its transformation, Oranga Tamariki is currently working to address eath of the identified areas for development. Pages 9 to 11 of this report summarise the Office of the Children's Commissioner's OPCAT findings related to their monitoring visits to our care and protection and youth justice residences for the period 1 July 2016 to 30 June 2017 As Oranga Tamariki has only existed since 1 April 2017, the report (itse) fonly covers the first three months of The Ministry's activities. • We have provided your office with a copy of the full report and will provide any additional support required.

### 1.3 Successful National NGO Forum

- As you are aware, the National NGO Forum took place on Thursday 28 June 2018 at the Westpac Stadium in Wellington. The Forum was attended by around 140 NGO, iwi and Māori representatives.
- There was a high degree of participation by all participants throughout the day and the use of digital engagement ensured that there were ongoing opportunities for participants to contribute and to receive immediate feedback on common themes.
- The activities throughout the day collected valuable input from stakeholders into our planning for new services the inclusion of 17 year olds in the youth justice system, transition services for 18-25 year olds and intensive intervention services for tamariki at risk of harm. The final session of the day focused on how NGOs, iwi and Māori can work together effectively in the future, which will inform future approaches to engagement with the sector.
- There was also discussion about section 7AA of the Oranga Tamariki Act related to improving and monitoring outcomes for tamariki Māori.
- In the days immediately following the Forum, Chief Executive Grainne Moss, received a significant number of communications from participants, including comments such as "... great to get clarity ...", "... there is a genuine shift ...", and "... we are being listened to".



.4 Social Worker Registration Legislation Bill

- The Minister of Social Development is expecting to take a paper to Cabinet in August that seeks agreement to policy changes and other amendments to the Social Workers Registration Logislation Bill via a Supplementary Order Paper.
- The policy changes have been informed by ongoing discussions between officials from the Ministry for Social Development and a sub-group of the Social Work Alliance (a sector stakeholder group) set up to respond to concerns raised by the sector during the submissions

### 2.2 Inspire Adventure Programme

- The Inspire Adventure Programme at Te Puna Wai Youth Justice residence was developed in partnership with a community group, Adventure Specialties Trust. Adventure Specialties have had an on-going relationship with Oranga Tamariki delivering similar programmes in the community and care and protection settings.
- The objective of the therapy programme is for the young people to learn more about themselves; how to manage their emotions and behavious; how to work with others and be inspired towards positive change. It provides a means to engage and motivate young people in identifying and addressing the causes of their offending.
- The programme is an eight week programme tailored to meet the needs of each group each week. The focus is giving the young people an opportunity to develop the sense of mastery at one activity and to create a community relationship that they can continue following their time in the residence.
- The programme recognises that whilst these young beople face significant challenges in their lives, they are often resilient, resourceful, fun loving independent young people who thrive when given the opportunity to learn and grow in a positive environment. Inspire endeavours to provide opportunities to discover and develop strengths whilst learning new skills to cope with their challenges.

# 2.3 Care Options Visibility Tool

- Some of the Care Taskforce funding, made available through the 2017 Budget Contingency Drawdown, has been used to develop a Care Options Visibility Tool (COVT) for use by Oranga Tamariki staff.
- The COVT will show all non-kin placement options at a site, regional and national level, including residences, contracted providers and family group homes.

- Until now a single view of all placement options has not been available. Development of the COVT will enable a better understanding of the supply of caregivers, placement availability and whether the skills and abilities of caregivers match the needs of children requiring care.
- To support its implementation, 11 regionally-based Caregiver Support Coordinators have been appointed to improve the quality of existing data, provide analysis and placement information to sites.
- The COVT and appointment of the Caregiver Support Coordinators will ensure that a clearer
  picture of placement options leads to decisions that best meet the needs of children and
  young people.

The COVT will go live on 23 July 2018 and will be accessible after hours.

# 2.4 Child Poverty Reduction Bill

# Positive Feedback from the Judiciary for Korowai Manaaki Staff A young man who was in custody under a Youth Justice Supervision with Residence Order has been released early. The young man proactively engaged in health, education and other programmes on offer at Korowai Manaaki Youth Justice Residence. He completed his Learner Licence, a fork-hoist course, and employment ready programme and became a gym assistant at the residence. Staff worked hard to support him, including by helping him sign up to rugby league and taking him to practices and games. # 2.3 Induction Programme for Youth Justice and Care and Protection Co-ordinators • The Oranga Tamariki Induction Programme for Youth Justice and Care and Protection Co-ordinators

- The Oranga Tamariki Induction Programme for Youth Justice and Care and Protection Coordinators commenced in September 2017. The programme encourages Co-ordinators to work in a supportive, innovative and creative manner with their colleagues, tamariki and whanau, and for Youth Justice co-ordinators, with victims also.
- To date three care and Protection Co-ordinator Induction Programmes have been completed.
- The second Youth Justice Co-ordinator Induction Programme was completed on 6 July with 15 people graduating.
- A (of around 200) co-ordinators have completed the induction programme to date and 15 experienced co-ordinators have completed a refresher course.
- The intended outcome of the programme is to ensure that Co-ordinators have the knowledge they need to perform their roles effectively and efficiently.

# Youth Justice Residential Refurbishment and Refresh Building and painting contractors are currently working at Korowai Manaaki and have nearly finished work in the first 12 bed unit. You may have seen this work in progress during your

- recent visit. The contractors are scheduled to move onto a second 12 bed unit shortly.
- The refresh programme at Te Maioha o Parekarangi (TMoP) is now complete; however, there
  is some on-going minor remedial work underway. This minor work has no impact on the dayto-day operation of the residence.
- To ensure that the units remain in good condition and retain their new look staff at TMoP have implemented a specialised behavioural management programme to encourage young people to treat their environment with respect.
- The refurbishment/refresh programme is scheduled to commence at Te Puna Wai o Tuhinapo in September.

# 2.5 Work with Ngapuhi Iwi Social Services

- We are working closely with Ngapuhi Iwi Social Services (NISS) to train and assist staff to begin
  delivering a range of care and youth justice services
- During July residential staff members from Korowai Manaaki delivered four days of training to NISS staff, caregivers and mentors.
- In total around 30 NISS caregivers, staff and mentors attended two sessions. Initial feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive. Further training is being planned.
- NISS will provide a range of services including community based one to one remand services.

  This is a new service that we are trialling.
- On 16 July a young man who was remanded in the costody of the chief executive for alleged
  offending was placed with NISS.
- On 17 July he spent the morning with renowned kaumātua learning the history of the area and migration. He has engaged really well and was demonstrating good use of te reo. The session was valuable, particularly as the young many's about to become a father.
- We will keep you updated on how the placement progresses.

# 2.6 Services for Youth Offending

- In Budget 2017 the Ministry of Justice secured funding for three services aimed at reducing offending by 14-16 year olds. The funding was to establish professional mentoring services, Functional Family Therapy and a new Cognitive Behavioural Programme. Total funding for all three services was \$1.25m in 2017/18 rising to \$4.972m by 2020/21 and out-years. The funding was to sit in Vote Justice but the services procured by Oranga Tamariki. Additional to the funding for services Justice retained responsibility for establishing an evaluation programme with additional funding of \$900k over four years allocated for evaluation.
  - As part of the Budget 2018 process funding of \$19.263m was reprioritised from Vote Justice and set aside in a multi-year tagged contingency entitled "Services to Reduce Youth Offending". The funding profile is \$1.691 for 18/19 rising to \$5.327 by 2022/23 and out-years. Responsibility for evaluation now sits with Oranga Tamariki and evaluation funding has been included in the revised funding profile.
- Cabinet has authorised the Minister of Finance and the Minister for Children to draw down the contingency once Treasury has approved the procurement and evaluation plans.
- We are meeting with Treasury in the next week to present a draft evaluation plan and procurement approach. We will also seek to confirm with Treasury what areas of flexibility there are in the distribution of funding between the three designated services. This will include testing whether the original specification to reduce offending by 14-16 year olds can be

- amended to include 17 year olds to reflect the extension of youth court jurisdiction from 1 July
- Following the meeting with Treasury we will submit a final evaluation plan and procurement plan for Treasury approval by the end of August. Subject to those plans being agreed, we will further brief you in September with a detailed procurement and implementation plan.
- Once the plan is agreed, we will submit a joint paper to you and the Minister of Finance to seek agreement to draw down the funding.





#### 2.2 Engaging All New Zealanders Update

#### 2.6 Relationship with Archata Prison

- Arohata Prison, a Corrections facility for minimum to high security female prisoners located in the suburb of Tawa, sits on the boundary of the Porirua and Wellington Oranga Tamariki sites.
- There is a new initiative for Practice Leaders on both sites to liaise closely with the Prison staff, including the Principal Case Manager, social workers, the Custodial Manager and from time to time other senior Corrections staff members. The aim is to increase an understanding of our roles, share information where appropriate, and work together towards better outcomes for the children of the women in prison.

# 2.1 Outstanding Inspectorate Report for North Yorkshire Children and Young People's Service

 On 26 April, you met with Yorkshire. Children and Young People's Service, North

- In July, the United Kingdom Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills (OFSTED) completed an inspection of the children and young people's service. These inspections focus on the effectiveness of local authority services in the areas of leadership and practice through the experiences and progress for children needing help and protection, those in care, and care leavers.
- The results of the inspection have been published and North Yorkshire received an Contstanding grade for all areas noting children and families in North Yorkshire receive a consistent, high quality service.
- North Yockshire is the first local authority to reach this standard (across all areas) in the UK.
- Peedback by the inspectorate on the outstanding rating included they found practice is having a demonstrably positive impact on effecting change for children and families, there are well-established multi-agency partnerships, work is child-centred, the leadership team is ambitious and forward thinking and a stable workforce has been maintained.

We have congratulated there in his team's outstanding achievement which we of course observed during our visit there.


### 2.2 Changes for our Privacy and Official Information Team


 Our Privacy and Official Information (POI) team responds to requests from individuals for information about themselves or a person they are representing. The team handles around 10,000 requests each year, representing around 5 million pages of information.

- Since late 2017, we have been working with the State Services Commission's Better Every Day
  programme to improve the customer's experience of POI's services. After a significant period
  of testing new approaches, we are at the point where we plan to roll the model we have been
  testing out across the full team.
- The key changes in this new model are:
  - o a shift from a functionalised process to one in which one person manages a request from start to finish;
  - o increased engagement with the customer through the process to ensure we meet the customer's demand;
  - o increased choice for customers in how they receive the information;
  - o a support model for POI staff that is based on real-time coaching.
- On 16 August, we announced to staff a proposed new structure for POI to support this new way of working. The key structural changes are in the administrative support and senior advisor/coaching roles. While there is some change to the nature of these roles, we expect this change to be of minimal impact to the people in POI. There is no reduction in the number of roles available, and all permanent staff should be able to either stay in their current roles, or move into roles very similar to their existing roles.
- We plan to consult on this proposed change for a week, and arrive at final decisions shortly
  after that. We will update you through the QTV prior to final decisions.

#### 2.5 Mātua Rautia te Tamaiti (One child, Many Parents)

- An exciting opportunity for caregiving whanau has been offered by Kokiri Marae Health and Social Services.
- This is a pilot programme to provide greater support for caregivers, and is one of six being piloted across the country. There is a need for specialised training to support our caregivers in dealing with trauma that children in their care have experienced was identified.
- The Matua Rautia caregiver training package is an extensive one combining group sessions, coaching, peer support groups as well as online training.
- This therapeutic parenting programme is based on a matauranga Maori bi-cultural approach with a focus on restoring the mana of children in care.
- It is expected that one of the key outcomes will be improved confidence in caring for children and better attachment, resulting in less likelihood that breakdowns occur given the kete of knowledge and actionable skills that the caregiver will be able to draw from.
- This is a collaborative approach to enhance the care experiences of children with whanau caregivers and is part of our strategic intentions of working with NGOs and iwi in new ways to build stropger services for our children and young people.
- The programme is due to start in a number of weeks with caregivers from across Greater

  Wellington having been contacted.
  - The overwhelming response has been one of feeling appreciated and valued with a sense of positive change in our new approach.

#### 2.6 Caregiver Recruitment and Support Team Update

- There is work starting this week to restructure the caregiver recruitment and support team.

  This restructure will align all caregiver social workers and other caregiver staff to the Caregiver Recruitment and Support team.
- Currently these staff are located through the Children and Family Services team.
- The benefit of this work will be a dedicated focus to caregivers to meet their needs and our care standards requirements.
- Consultation with affected staff started 16 August and we will keep your Office updated on this as it progresses.

#### 2.7 Care Options Visibility Tool

- Our regionally based Caregiver Support Coordinators recently completed a calling campaign to our non-kin caregivers.
- They made around 1100 phone calls over a fortnight and spoke to caregivers about our 24/7 guidance and support line, checking if they were aware of it and whether they'd used it. Many caregivers expressed their appreciation for the contact being made.
- Anything that needed follow up was passed on to the individual Caregiver Social Worker who
  looks after that caregiver. This was a great opportunity for our caregiver social workers to
  continue to maintain and develop positive relationships with their caregivers.
- These calls were also an opportunity to check that the contact details we have for our caregivers were correct, keeping our CYRAS database up to date.
- This database supports the Care Options Visibility Tool (GOVT) search tool that shows all non-kin placement options at a site, regional and national level, including residences, contracted providers and family group homes.
- The COVT went live recently and we've already had positive feedback from sites about successful placements being found.

- South Auckland has a council funded approach called the Southern Initiative and was invited to contribute to the newly announced Western Initiative.
- The Council have been given \$5 million dollars to spend over 5 years on an initiative in West Auckland with a focus or youth, employment and determining need in West Auckland.
- oined 35 others at Council chambers on 10 August to start the discussions on how this money could be spent in West Auckland. It was positive that Oranga Tamariki was invited and included with the community to have these conversations as it really showed an all of New Zealand approach to real community issues.

#### 2.9 Children in Care Christmas Party 2018

#### 2.10 Books in Youth Justice Facilities

- You asked for some information about the availability of books in youth justice facilities (remand homes in particular).
- Education services are provided in all of our youth justice facilities, which includes access to hooks:
  - o In residences Kingslea school is the primary provider

- o In remand homes we engage various other education providers
- Under current practice, care plans include information about the individual needs of each
  child or young person, including education needs, and we respond by ensuring that resources
  are provided to meet those needs. This includes any books they want or need (which the child
  or young person takes with them when they leave).
- We do not have a clear picture of the availability of books in remand homes that children and young people can self-select.
- The Ministry is also working with the providers who staff the remand homes to shift the homes to a more home-like environment and shelves of books is one way to help this shift.
- We will do some work to determine whether there is an issue with books not being available.
- We have contacted the National Library to begin discussions about what is available to improve provision of books in remand homes in the meantime.
- We will do some work to gain a better understanding of the availability of books in remand homes and develop a plan to improve availability where needed. We will report back to you on our findings and any responses to findings in September.

#### 2.11 Background Risk Indicator model Social Network Analysis work

- The Ministry of Social Development (MSD) in 2016 engaged Te Punaha Matatini, University of Canterbury/University of Auckland to undertake exploratory work on social network analysis and its ability to better understand risk to children.
- Social Network analysis refers to the modelling of social relationships around a child/family to identify and understand risk and protective factors. This work was completed by the academics using data supplied under a data sharing agreement with MSD. The academics now want to publish this research in an academic journal "The American Association for the Advancement of Science".
- MSD and Oranga Tamariki are not at this stage, intending to take this exploratory work further and there is no intention to implement this approach in business operations. It has overall proved valuable in underscoring the importance of networks and relationships around a child and the implications for better understanding risks to a child as well as protective relationships around a child.

MSD had provided data to the University to build the model in 2015 and we will forward a copy of this report to your office. MSD will update their Minister on this work.





# 1. Oranga Tamariki Operating Model: Cabinet Papers and Budget 2019








#### 3.4 Providing Children with Suitcases

- We understand that when the VOYCE National Youth Council met with you ar 27 July 2018, the Council suggested that children and young people in care could be provided with a suitcase to help them when they move between placements.
- We will work with the Youth Council to gain a fuller understanding of the need they have identified in particular, to understand what else might support children and young people during transitions between placements—and to determine how best we meet this need, including consideration of the role of Oranga Tamariki and partners such as philanthropy.
- In addition, the Oranga Tamariki Care Standards Regulations require that "the Chief Executive must ensure that a child or young person in care or custody is able to have their own personal belongings, including taonga, clothing, a suitable bag such as a backpack or suitcase, and bedding".
- The Care Standards team is working with the VOYCE National Youth Council to ensure that Schedule 2 of the Care Standards Regulations, which is a statement for children and young persons to understand their rights to care and support under the regulations, is provided in a way that children and young people will understand. The Council will contribute to the way the requirement to have a suitable bag for their belonging's is reflected in information provided to children and young people.

• We will keep you informed or progress on both aspects of this work.
